

# **Product introduction**

### 1.1 Welcome!

#### Thank you for buying the ASUS® P4VP-MX motherboard!

The ASUS P4VP-MX motherboard delivers a host of new features and latest technologies making it another standout in the long line of ASUS quality motherboards!

The P4VP-MX incorporates the Intel® Pentium® 4 Processor in 478-pin package with support for Intel®'s Hyper-Threading Technology and the Intel® Prescott CPU coupled with the VIA® VT8751A and VIA® VT8235 chipsets to set a new benchmark for an effective desktop platform solution.

Supporting up to 2GB of system memory with PC2100/PC1600 DDR SDRAM, high-resolution graphics via integrated VIA S3 ProSavage8 graphics and an AGP 4X slot, USB 2.0, and 6-channel audio features, the P4VP-MX is your affordable vehicle to enter the world of computing!

Before you start installing the motherboard, and hardware devices on it, check the items in your package with the list below.





### 1.4 Motherboard components

Before you install the motherboard, learn about its major components and available features to facilitate the installation and future upgrades. Refer to the succeeding pages for the component descriptions.



- **ATX power connector.** This 20-pin connector connects to an ATX power supply.
- **CPU socket.** A 478-pin surface mount, Zero Insertion Force (ZIF) socket for the Intel® Pentium® 4 Processor, with 533/400 MHz system bus that allows 4.2GB/s, and 3.2GB/s data transfer rates, respectively.
- North bridge controller. The VIA® VT8751A provides the processor interface with 533/400 MHz frequency, system memory interface at 266MHz operation, and 1.5V AGP interface that supports AGP 2.0 specification including 4X Fast Write protocol.
- DDR DIMM sockets. These two 184-pin DIMM sockets support up to 2GB system memory using unbuffered non-ECC PC2100/PC1600 DDR DIMMs.
- IDE connectors. These dual-channel bus master IDE connectors support Ultra DMA133/100/66/33, PIO Modes 3 & 4 IDE devices. Both the primary (blue) and secondary (black) connectors are slotted to prevent incorrect insertion of the IDE ribbon cable.
- AGP 4X slot. This Accelerated Graphics Port (AGP) slot supports 1.5V AGP 4X mode graphics cards for 3D graphical applications.
- South bridge controller. The VIA® VT8235 integrated peripheral controller supports various I/O functions including 2-channel ATA/133 bus master IDE controller, up to six USB 2.0 ports, LPC Super I/O interface, AC'97 interface and PCI 2.2 interface.
- Floppy disk connector. This connector accommodates the provided ribbon cable for the floppy disk drive. One side of the connector is slotted to prevent incorrect insertion of the floppy disk cable.
- Standby power LED. This LED lights up if there is a standby power on the motherboard. This LED acts as a reminder to turn off the system power before plugging or unplugging devices.
- Audio CODEC. The Realtek ALC655 is an AC'97 CODEC that allows 6-channel audio playback.
- Super I/O controller. This Low Pin Count (LPC) interface provides the commonly used Super I/O functionality. The chipset supports a high-performance floppy disk controller for a 360K/720K/1.44M/2.88M floppy disk drive, a multi-mode parallel port, a Game/MIDI port and a standard compatible UART.
- PCI slots. These 32-bit PCI 2.2 expansion slots support bus master PCI cards like SCSI or LAN cards with 133MB/s maximum throughput.
- **Flash ROM.** This 3Mb firmware contains the programmable BIOS program.
- **PS/2 mouse port.** This green 6-pin connector is for a PS/2 mouse.
- Parallel port. This 25-pin port connects a parallel printer, a scanner, or other devices.
- RJ-45 port. This port allows connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub.

- Line In jack. This Line In (light blue) jack connects a tape player or other audio sources. In 6-channel mode, the function of this jack becomes Rear Speaker Out.
- Line Out jack. This Line Out (lime) jack connects a headphone or a speaker. In 6-channel mode, the function of this jack becomes Front Speaker Out.
- Microphone jack. This Mic (pink) jack connects a microphone. In 6-channel mode, the function of this jack becomes Bass/Center Speaker Out.





- USB 2.0 ports 1 and 2. These two 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports are available for connecting USB 2.0 devices.
- Video Graphics Adapter port. This 15-pin port is for a VGA monitor or other VGA-compatible devices.
- **Serial port.** This 9-pin COM1 port is for pointing devices or other serial devices.
- USB 2.0 ports 3 and 4. These two 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports are available for connecting USB 2.0 devices.
- **PS/2 keyboard port.** This purple connector is for a PS/2 keyboard.

### 1.6 Before you proceed


Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.



- 1. Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- 2. Use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or to a metal object, such as the power supply case, before handling components to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- 3. Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- 4. Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the ATX
  power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the
  power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the
  motherboard, peripherals, and/or components.

#### **Onboard LED**

The motherboard comes with a standby power LED. When lit, this green LED indicates that the system is ON, in sleep mode, or in soft-off mode, a reminder that you should shut down the system and unplug the power cable before removing or plugging in any motherboard component. The illustration below shows the location of the onboard LED.



### 1.7 Motherboard installation

Before you install the motherboard, study the configuration of your chassis to ensure that the motherboard fits into it. The motherboard uses the micro-ATX form factor that measures 9.6 inches x 8.0 inches (24.5 cm x 20.5 cm).



Make sure to unplug the power cord before installing or removing the motherboard. Failure to do so may cause you physical injury and damage motherboard components.

### 1.7.1 Placement direction


When installing the motherboard, make sure that you place it into the chassis in the correct orientation. The edge with external ports goes to the rear part of the chassis as indicated in the image below.

### 1.7.2 Screw holes

Place seven (7) screws into the holes indicated by circles to secure the motherboard to the chassis.



Do not overtighten the screws! Doing so may damage the motherboard.




Place this side towards the rear of the chassis

### **1.8 Central Processing Unit (CPU)**

### 1.8.1 Overview

The motherboard comes with a surface mount 478-pin Zero Insertion Force (ZIF) socket. The socket is designed for the Intel® Pentium® 4 and Prescott processors in the 478-pin package. This processor supports 533/400MHz front side bus (FSB), and allows data transfer rates of up to 4.3GB/s.

Note in the illustration that the CPU has a gold triangular mark on one corner. This mark indicates the processor Pin 1 that should match a specific corner of the CPU socket.





Incorrect installation of the CPU into the socket may bend the pins and severely damage the CPU!

#### Notes on Intel® Hyper-Threading Technology



- 1. This motherboard supports Intel® Pentium 4 CPUs with Hyper-Threading Technology.
- 2. Make sure to enable the **Hyper-Threading Technology** item in the BIOS before installing a supported operating system. See page 2-12.
- 3. To verify the Hyper-Threading feature, go to the Windows OS **System Properties -> Hardware -> Device Manager -> Processors**. The list should display two existing processors.
- 4. Hyper-Threading Technology is supported under **Windows® XP** and later versions only.
- 5. It is recommended that you install Windows® XP Service Pack 1.
- 6. For more information on Hyper-Threading Technology, visit www.intel.com/info/hyperthreading.


To use the Hyper-Threading Technology on this motherboard:

- 1. Buy an Intel® Pentium 4 CPU that supports Hyper-Threading Technology. Install the CPU.
- 2. Power up the system and enter BIOS Setup (see Chapter 2). Under the Advanced Menu, make sure that the item **Hyper-Threading Technology** is set to Enabled. The item appears only if you installed a CPU that supports Hyper-Threading Technology.
- 3. Reboot the computer.

### 1.8.2 Installing the CPU

Follow these steps to install a CPU.


- 1. Locate the 478-pin ZIF socket on the motherboard.
- Unlock the socket by pressing the lever sideways, then lift it up to a 90°-100° angle.
   Socket Lever





Make sure that the socket lever is lifted up to 90°-100° angle, otherwise the CPU does not fit in completely.

- 3. Position the CPU above the socket such that its marked corner matches the base of the socket lever.
- 4. Carefully insert the CPU into the socket until it fits in place.






The CPU fits only in one correct orientation. DO NOT force the CPU into the socket to prevent bending the pins and damaging the CPU!

- When the CPU is in place, push down the socket lever to secure the CPU. The lever clicks on the side tab to indicate that it is locked.
- 6. Install a CPU heatsink and fan following the instructions that came with the heatsink package.
- 7. Connect the CPU fan cable to the CPU\_FAN1 connector on the motherboard.



### 1.9 System memory

The motherboard comes with two Double Data Rate (DDR) Dual Inline Memory Module (DIMM) sockets. These sockets support up to 2GB system memory using 184-pin unbuffered non-ECC PC2100/PC1600 DDR DIMMs. The following figure shows the location of the DDR DIMM sockets.



P4VP-MX 184-Pin DDR DIMM Sockets


### 1.9.1 Installing a DIMM



Make sure to unplug the power supply before adding or removing DIMMs or other system components. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to both the motherboard and the components.

Follow these steps to install a DIMM.

- Unlock a DIMM socket by pressing the retaining clips outward.
- Align a DIMM on the socket such that the notch on the DIMM matches the break on the socket.
- Firmly insert the DIMM into the socket until the retaining clips snap back in place and the DIMM is properly seated.



### **1.10 Expansion slots**

The motherboard has three PCI slots and one Accelerated Graphics Port (AGP) slot.

To install and configure an expansion card:

- 1. Install an expansion card following the instructions that came with the chassis.
- 2. Turn on the system and change the necessary BIOS settings, if any. See Chapter 2 for BIOS information.
- 3. Assign an IRQ to the card. Refer to the tables below.
- 4. Install the drivers and/or software applications for the expansion card according to the card documentation.



### 1.10.3 PCI slots


There are three 32-bit PCI slots on this motherboard. The slots support PCI cards such as a LAN card, SCSI card, USB card, and other cards that comply with PCI specifications.



### 1.10.4 AGP slot

This motherboard has an Accelerated Graphics Port (AGP) slot that supports AGP 4X (1.5V) cards.

Note the notches on the card golden fingers to ensure that they fit the AGP slot on your motherboard.

### 1.11 Jumper

#### 1. Clear RTC RAM (CLRTC1)


This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of date, time, and system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The RAM data in CMOS, that include system setup information such as system passwords, is powered by the onboard button cell battery.

#### To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- 4. Hold down the <Del> key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to re-enter data.



Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on the jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!




P4VP-MX Clear RTC RAM Setting

#### 2. USB device wake-up (3-pin USBPWR12, USBPWR34, USBPWR56)

Set these jumpers to +5V to wake up the computer from S1 sleep mode (CPU stopped, DRAM refreshed, system running in low power mode) using the connected USB devices. Set to +5VSB to wake up from S3 sleep mode (no power to CPU, DRAM in slow refresh, power supply in reduced power mode). The USBPWR56 jumpers are for the internal USB header that you can connect to the front USB ports.



- This feature requires a power supply that can provide at least 1A on the +5VSB lead when these jumpers are set to +5VSB.
   Otherwise, the system does not power up.
- 2. The total current consumed must NOT exceed the power supply capability (+5VSB) whether under normal or in sleep mode.




### 1.12 Connectors

This section describes and illustrates the internal connectors on the motherboard.

#### 1. Floppy disk drive connector (34-1 pin FLOPPY1)


This connector supports the provided floppy drive ribbon cable. After connecting one end to the motherboard, connect the other end to the floppy drive. (Pin 5 is removed to prevent incorrect insertion when using ribbon cables with pin 5 plug).

#### 2. GAME/MIDI connector (16-1 pin GAME1)

This connector supports a GAME/MIDI module. Connect the GAME/MIDI cable with yellow connector to the yellow header onboard. The GAME/MIDI port on the module connects a joystick or a game pad for playing games, and MIDI devices for playing or editing audio files.






The GAME/MIDI module is purchased separately.

#### 3. IDE connectors (40-1 pin PRI\_IDE, SEC\_IDE)

This connector supports the provided UltraDMA133/100 IDE ribbon cable. Connect the cable's blue connector to the primary (recommended) or secondary IDE connector, then connect the gray connector to the UltraDMA133/100 slave device (hard disk drive) and the black connector to the UltraDMA133/100 master device. It is recommended that you connect non-UltraDMA133/100 devices to the secondary IDE connector. If you install two hard disks, you must configure the second drive as a slave device by setting its jumper accordingly. Refer to the hard disk documentation for the jumper settings. BIOS supports specific device bootup. If you have more than two UltraDMA133/100 devices, purchase another UltraDMA133/100 cable. You may configure two hard disks to be both master devices with two ribbon cables – one for the primary IDE connector and another for the secondary IDE connector.




- Pin 20 on each IDE connector is removed to match the covered hole on the UltraDMA cable connector. This prevents incorrect orientation when you connect the cables.
- 2. The hole near the blue connector on the UltraDMA133/100/66 cable is intentional.
- 3. For UltraDMA133/100/66 IDE devices, use the 80-conductor IDE cable.

#### 4. Front panel audio connector (10-1 pin AUDIO1)

This is an interface for the Intel front panel audio cable that allow convenient connection and control of audio devices.




**P4VP-MX Front Panel Audio Connector** 

#### 5. ATX power connectors (20-pin ATXPWR1)

These connectors connect to an ATX 12V power supply. The plugs from the power supply are designed to fit these connectors in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connectors completely fit.



Make sure that your ATX 12V power supply can provide 8A on the +12V lead and at least 1A on the +5-volt standby lead (+5VSB). The minimum recommended wattage is 250W, or 300W for a fully configured system. The system may become unstable and may experience difficulty powering up if the power supply is inadequate.




#### 6. CPU and chassis fan connectors (3-pin CPU\_FAN1, CHA\_FAN1)

The fan connectors support cooling fans of 350mA~740mA (8.88W max.) or a total of 1A~2.22A (26.64W max.) at +12V. Connect the fan cables to the fan connectors on the motherboard, making sure that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.




Do not forget to connect the fan cables to the fan connectors. Lack of sufficient air flow within the system may damage the motherboard components. These are not jumpers! DO NOT place jumper caps on the fan connectors!



#### 7. System Power LED connector (3-pin PLED1)

This 3-pin connector connects to the system power LED. If your case supports a 3-pin connector, use this connector instead of the power LED connector in the system panel.




#### 8. USB header (10-1 pin USB56)

If the USB ports on the rear panel are inadequate, two USB headers are available for additional USB ports. The USB header complies with USB 2.0 specification that supports up to 480 Mbps connection speed. This speed advantage over the conventional 12 Mbps on USB 1.1 allows faster Internet connection, interactive gaming, and simultaneous running of high-speed peripherals.

Connect an optional USB 2.0/GAME module to this header. The module has two USB 2.0 ports that support the next generation USB peripherals such as high resolution cameras, scanners, and printers.



You must install the driver before you can use the USB 2.0 capability.




#### 9. Internal audio connectors (4-pin CD1, AUX1, MODEM1)

These connectors allow you to receive stereo audio input from sound sources such as a CD-ROM, TV tuner, or MPEG card. The MODEM connector allows the onboard audio to interfeace with a voice modem card with a similar connector. It also allows the sharing of mono\_in (such as a phone) and a mono\_out (such as a speaker) between the audio and a voice modem card.



#### 10. Speaker connector (4-pin SPEAKER1)


This 4-pin connector connects to the case-mounted speaker and allows you to hear system beeps and warnings.

#### 11. System panel connector (10-1 pin PANEL1)

This connector accommodates several system front panel functions.

### System Power LED Lead (2-pin PWR LED)

This 2-1 pin connector connects to the system power LED. The LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

#### Hard disk activity LED (2-pin HD LED)

This 2-pin connector supplies power to the hard disk activity LED. The read and write activities of any device connected to the primary or secondary IDE connector cause this LED to light up.


#### ATX Power Switch / Soft-Off Switch Lead (2-pin PWR BTN)

This connector connects a switch that controls the system power. Pressing the power switch turns the system between ON and SLEEP, or ON and SOFT OFF, depending on the BIOS or OS settings. Pressing the power switch while in the ON mode for more than 4 seconds turns the system OFF.

#### Reset Switch Lead (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin connector connects to the case-mounted reset switch for rebooting the system without turning off the system power.

# **BIOS** information

### 2.1 Managing and updating your BIOS



The **original BIOS file** for this motherboard is in the support CD.

Copy the original BIOS to a **bootable floppy disk** in case you need to restore the BIOS in the future.

### 2.1.1 Creating a bootable floppy disk

1. Do either one of the following to create a bootable floppy disk.

#### **DOS** environment

Insert a 1.44 MB floppy disk into the drive. At the DOS prompt, type:

format A:/S <Enter>

#### Windows environment

- a. From your Windows desktop, click on **Start**, point to **Settings**, then click on **Control Panel**.
- b. Double-click on Add/Remove Programs icon from the Control Panel window.
- c. Click on the **Startup Disk** tab, then on **Create Disk...** button.
- d. Insert a 1.44 MB floppy disk when prompted. Follow the succeeding screen instructions to complete the process.
- 2. Copy the original (or the latest) motherboard BIOS to the bootable floppy disk.

### 2.1.2 Using AFUDOS to update the BIOS

Update the BIOS using the AFUDOS.EXE utility in DOS environment.

1. Visit the ASUS website (www.asus.com) to download the latest BIOS file for your motherboard. Save the BIOS file to a bootable floppy disk.



Write down the BIOS file name to a piece of paper. You need to type the **exact BIOS file name** at the prompt.

- 2. Copy the AFUDOS.EXE utility from the support CD to the bootable floppy disk that contains the BIOS file.
- 3. Boot the system from the floppy disk.
- 4. At the DOS prompt, type the command line:

#### afudos /i<filename.rom>

where "filename.rom" means the latest (or original) BIOS file that you copied to the bootable floppy disk.

### 2.1.3 Using ASUS EZ Flash to update the BIOS

The ASUS EZ Flash feature allows you to easily update the BIOS without having to go through the long process of booting from a diskette and using a DOS-based utility. The EZ Flash is built-in the BIOS firmware so it is accessible by simply pressing <Alt> + <F2> during the Power-On Self Tests (POST).

Follow these steps to update the BIOS using ASUS EZ Flash.

1. Download the latest BIOS file from the ASUS website (see ASUS contact information on page viii). Save the file to a floppy disk.



Write down the BIOS file name on a piece of paper. You need to type the **exact BIOS file name** at the EZ Flash screen.

- 2. Reboot the computer.
- 3. To use EZ Flash, press <Alt> + <F2> during POST to display the following screen.

- 4. Insert the disk that contains the new BIOS file into the floppy drive. You will receive the error message, "WARNING! Device not ready." if you proceed to step 5 without the disk in the drive.
- 5. At the prompt, "Please Enter File Name for NEW BIOS: \_", type in the BIOS file name that you downloaded from the ASUS website, then press <Enter>. EZ Flash will automatically access drive A to look for the file name that you typed. When found, the following message appears on screen.

7. Press Y to completely update the main BIOS area.



DO NOT shutdown or reset the system while updating the BIOS boot block area! Doing so may cause system boot failure.

8. When the update process is done, the message, "Press a key to reboot" appears. Press any key to reboot the system with the new BIOS.

# 2.1.4 Recovering the BIOS with CrashFree BIOS 2

The CrashFree BIOS 2 auto recovery tool allows you to restore BIOS from the motherboard support CD, or from a floppy disk that contains the BIOS file, in case the current BIOS on the motherboard fails or gets corrupted.



- Prepare the support CD that came with the motherboard or a bootable floppy disk that contains the motherboard BIOS before proceeding with the BIOS update process.
- 2. If you have saved a copy of the original motherboard BIOS to a bootable floppy disk, you may also use this disk to restore the BIOS. See section "2.1.1 Creating a bootable floppy disk"

### To recover the BIOS from a floppy disk:

- 1. Insert the bootable floppy disk into the floppy disk drive.
- 2. Turn on the computer.
- 3. Follow the BIOS update procedure in section "2.1.3 Using AFLASH to update the BIOS"



DO NOT shutdown or reset the system while updating the BIOS! Doing so may cause system boot failure!

### To recover the BIOS from the support CD:

- 1. Turn on the computer.
- 2. When the system prompts that a corrupted BIOS is detected, insert the motherboard support CD into the CD-ROM drive and press the **Enter** key.
- 3. Follow the succeeding screen instructions.

# 2.2 BIOS Setup program

This motherboard supports a programmable firmware hub (FWH) that you can update using the provided utility described in section "2.1 Managing and updating your BIOS."

Use the BIOS Setup program when you are installing a motherboard, reconfiguring your system, or prompted to "Run Setup". This section explains how to configure your system using this utility.

Even if you are not prompted to use the Setup program, you may want to change the configuration of your computer in the future. For example, you may want to enable the security password feature or change the power management settings. This requires you to reconfigure your system using the BIOS Setup program so that the computer can recognize these changes and record them in the CMOS RAM of the firmware hub.

The firmware hub on the motherboard stores the Setup utility. When you start up the computer, the system provides you with the opportunity to run this program. Press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST) to enter the Setup utility. Otherwise, POST continues with its test routines.

If you wish to enter Setup after POST, restart the system by pressing <Ctrl> + <Alt> + <Delete>, or by pressing the reset button on the system chassis. You can also restart by turning the system off and then back on. Do this last option only if the first two failed.

The Setup program is designed to make it as easy to use as possible. It is a menudriven program, which means you can scroll through the various sub-menus and make your selections from the available options using the navigation keys.




If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to ensure system stability. Select the **Load Default Settings** item under the Exit Menu. See section "2.7 Exit Menu."

These fields show the values for the menu items. If an item is user-configurable, you may change the value of the field opposite the item. You can not select an item that is not user-configurable.







# 2.3.4 Primary/Secondary IDE Master/Slave

### Power On KBC [Disabled]

This item allows you to enable or disable the use of specific keys on the keyboard to turn on the system. This feature requires an ATX power supply that provides at least 1A on the +5VSB lead. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

### Power On By PS/2 Mouse [Disabled]


This item allows you to enable or disable the use of the PS/2 mouse to resume the system. This feature requires an ATX power supply that provides at least 1A on the +5VSB lead. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

### Power On RTC Alarm [Disabled]

Allows you to enable or disable RTC to generate a wake event. When this item is set to Enabled, the items RTC Alarm Date, RTC Alarm Hour, RTC Alarm Minute, and RTC Alarm Second appear with set values.

Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

### 2.5.6 Hardware Monitor



# CPU Temperature [xxxC/xxxF] MB Temperature [xxxC/xxxF]

The onboard hardware monitor automatically detects and displays the motherboard and CPU temperatures.

# CPU Fan Speed [xxxxRPM] or [N/A] Chassis Fan Speed [xxxxRPM] or [N/A]

The onboard hardware monitor automatically detects and displays the CPU and chassis fan speeds in rotations per minute (RPM). If any of the fans is not connected to the motherboard, the specific field shows N/A.

### VCORE Voltage, +3.3V Voltage, +5V Voltage, +12V Voltage


The onboard hardware monitor automatically detects the voltage output through the onboard voltage regulators.




If any of the monitored items is out of range, the following error message appears: "Hardware Monitor found an error. Enter Power setup menu for details". You will then be prompted to "Press F1 to continue or DEL to enter SETUP".

# 2.6 Boot menu

The Boot menu items allow you to change the system boot options. Select an item then press Enter to display the sub-menu.




# 2.6.1 Boot Device Priority



### 1st ~ xxth Boot Device [1st Floppy Drive]

These items specify the boot device priority sequence from the available devices. The number of device items that appear on the screen depends on the the number of devices installed in the system. Configuration options: [xxxxx Drive] [Disabled]

# 2.6.2 Boot Settings Configuration



#### **Quick Boot [Enabled]**

Enabling this item allows BIOS to skip some power on self tests (POST) while booting to decrease the time needed to boot the system. When set to [Disabled], BIOS performs all the POST items. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

### Full Screen Logo [Enabled]

This allows you to enable or disable the full screen logo display feature. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]



Make sure that the above item is set to [Enabled] if you wish to use the ASUS MyLogo feature.

### Add On ROM Display Mode [Force BIOS]

Sets the display mode for option ROM. Configuration options: [Force BIOS] [Keep Current]

### **Bootup Num-Lock [On]**

Allows you to select the power-on state for the NumLock. Configuration options: [Off] [On]

### PS/2 Mouse Support [Auto]

Allows you to enable or disable support for PS/2 mouse. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled] [Auto]

### Wait for 'F1' If Error [Enabled]

When set to Enabled, the system waits for F1 key to be pressed when error occurs. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

### Hit 'DEL' Message Display [Enabled]

When set to Enabled, the system displays the message "Press DEL to run Setup" during POST. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]


### **Interrupt 19 Capture [Disabled]**

When set to Enabled, the system allows option ROMs to trap interrupt 19. This is required by some PCI cards that provide a ROM based setup utility.

Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

# 2.6.3 Security

The Security menu items allow you to change the system security settings. Select an item then press Enter to display the configuration options.



### Set a Supervisor Password

Select this item to set or change the supervisor password. The Supervisor Password item on top of the screen shows the default **Not Installed**. After you have set a password, this item shows **Installed**.

To set a Supervisor Password:

- 1. Select the Change Supervisor Password item and press Enter.
- On the password box that appears, type a password composed of letters and/ or numbers, then press Enter. Your password should have at least six characters.
- 3. Confirm the password when prompted.

The message "Password Installed" appears after you have successfully set your password.

The Supervisor Password item now shows **Installed**.

#### **Change the Supervisor Password**

To change the supervisor password, follow the same steps as in setting a user password.

To clear the supervisor password, select the Change Supervisor Password then press Enter. The message "Password Uninstalled" appears.

After you have set a supervisor password, the other items appear to allow you to change other security settings.

### **Change User Password**

Select this item to set or change the user password. The User Password item on top of the screen shows the default **Not Installed**. After you have set a password, this item shows **Installed**.

To set a User Password:

- 1. Select the Change User Password item and press Enter.
- On the password box that appears, type a password composed of letters and/ or numbers, then press Enter. Your password should have at least six characters.
- Confirm the password when prompted.
   The message "Password Installed" appears after you have successfully set your password.

The User Password item now shows Installed.

To change the user password, follow the same steps as in setting a user password.

#### **Clear User Password**

Select this item if you wish to clear the user password.


### **Boot Sector Virus Protection [Disabled]**

Allows you to enable or disable the boot sector virus protection.

Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

# 2.7 Exit menu

The Exit menu items allow you to load the optimal or failsafe default values for the BIOS items, and save or discard your changes to the BIOS items.





Pressing <Esc> does not immediately exit this menu. Select one of the options from this menu or <F10> from the legend bar to exit.

### **Exit & Save Changes**

Once you are finished making your selections, choose this option from the Exit menu to ensure the values you selected are saved to the CMOS RAM. The CMOS RAM is sustained by an onboard backup battery and stays on even when the PC is turned off. When you select this option, a confirmation window appears. Select [Yes] to save changes and exit.



If you attempt to exit the Setup program without saving your changes, the program prompts you with a message asking if you want to save your changes before exiting. Pressing <Enter> saves the changes while exiting.

### **Exit & Discard Changes**

Select this option only if you do not want to save the changes that you made to the Setup program. If you made changes to fields other than system date, system time, and password, the BIOS asks for a confirmation before exiting.


### **Discard Changes**

This option allows you to discard the selections you made and restore the previously saved values. After selecting this option, a confirmation appears. Select [Yes] to discard any changes and load the previously saved values.

### **Load Setup Defaults**

This option allows you to load the default values for each of the parameters on the Setup menus. When you select this option or if you press <F5>, a confirmation window appears. Select [Yes] to load default values. Select Exit Saving Changes or make other changes before saving the values to the non-volatile RAM.

# Software support

# 3.1 Install an operating system

This motherboard supports Windows® 98SE/ME/2000/XP operating system (OS). Always install the latest OS version and corresponding updates so you can maximize the features of your hardware.



Because motherboard settings and hardware options vary, use the setup procedures presented in this chapter for general reference only. Refer to your OS documentation for more information.

# 3.2 Support CD information


The support CD that came with the motherboard contains useful software and several utility drivers that enhance the motherboard features.

# 3.2.1 Running the support CD

To begin using the support CD, simply insert the CD into your CD-ROM drive. The CD automatically displays the **Drivers** menu if Autorun is enabled in your computer.

If **Autorun** is NOT enabled in your computer, browse the contents of the support CD to locate the file ASSETUP.EXE from the BIN folder. Double-click the **ASSETUP.EXE** to run the CD.

### 3.2.2 Drivers menu

The drivers menu shows the available device drivers if the system detects installed devices. Install the necessary drivers to activate the devices.

#### VIA 4 in 1 drivers

This item installs the following drivers:

- VIA Registry (INF) driver
- VIA AGP VxD driver
- VIA ATAPI vendor support driver
- VIA PCI IRQ Miniport driver

#### S3 Driver

This item installs the VIA S3 ProSavage 8 Graphics display driver.

#### Realtek AC'97 Audio Driver

This item installs the Realtek AC'97 compliant audio controller and application.

#### VIA 10/100Mb LAN Driver

This item installs the VIA 10/100Mbps Fast Ethernet driver to support 10/100 Mbps networking.

#### **USB 2.0 Driver**

This item installs the USB 2.0 driver.

### 3.2.3 Utilities menu

The Utilities menu shows the applications and other software that the motherboard supports.



#### **ASUS PC Probe**

This smart utility monitors the fan speed, CPU temperature, and system voltages, and alerts you on any detected problems. This utility helps you keep your computer at a healthy operating condition.

### **Install ASUS Update**

This program allows you to download the latest version of the BIOS from the ASUS website. Before using the ASUS Update, make sure that you have an Internet connection so you can connect to the ASUS website.

#### PC-CILLIN 2002

This item installs the PC-cillin 2002 anti-virus program. View the PC-cillin online help for detailed information.

#### **Adobe Acrobat Reader**

This item installs the Adobe Acrobat Reader V5.0. The Acrobat Reader software is for viewing files saved in Portable Document Format (PDF).

#### **ASUS Screen Saver**

This item installs the ASUS screen saver.
